Expected Impact of Welfare Reform Changes for Fife by 2020

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Summary

Significant amounts of money have been, and are being, lost to local people and the local economy each year as a result of welfare benefit changes. The expected loss to the Fife economy is estimated at around £153 million, per year, by 2020. That means that, on average, each adult of working age will have around £655 less in their pocket each year. The geographical impact of the changes is uneven, with poorer communities more likely to be affected. The full impact of welfare reform changes has yet to be fully seen in Fife with some reforms yet to be implemented.

Background

The UK government has been making major changes to the welfare system in the UK since 2010. Research by Christina Beatty and Steve Fothergill of the Centre for Regional and Economic Social Research at Sheffield Hallam University highlights that the reforms have an uneven impact across the UK, with the poorest areas often hit hardest.

In 2014, the Scottish Parliament commissioned Beatty and Fothergill to look at the local impact of welfare reform in Scotland, at ward level. In 2016, estimates were updated to reflect what did go ahead from pre-2015 reform changes, and to take account of new reforms proposed post-2015. This briefing highlights the expected impact for Fife.

Fife Impact

Fife, like other areas across Scotland and the UK will see less money available to local people, and less money available to spend in the local economy, each year, as a result of welfare benefit changes. The full impact of this will not be seen until 2020.


The initial estimate (pre-2015 reforms) was a loss of £107m per year for Fife. This was subsequently revised downwards as some of the proposed reforms proposed did not go ahead, initially to £78m, and then back up to £96m to take account of changes to benefits uprating. Further reforms (post-2015) estimate financial losses of an additional £56m per year. Taken together the expected impact is around £153m. This figure is expected to be an underestimate as inflation remains higher than forecast.

Changes to the uprating of benefits results in a financial loss to Fife of £41.6m. Of this, £25.3m relates to the decision to use the Consumer Price Index (CPI) instead of the Retail Price Index (RPI) to set the value of benefits relative to inflation. There has also been a freeze on the uprating of benefits between 2016/17 and 2019/20, known as the 'Benefits freeze', which in itself means £21.6m less per year for Fife. This means that the value of benefits is falling short of what is needed to meet the cost of living.

Other changes to tax credits (pre 2015) and child benefit, estimate losses of £25.5m and £16.8m respectively. In addition, changes expected through Universal Credit Childcare Costs and Tax Credit Income disregards are expected to result in a loss of £13.3m. Local Impact

The local impact of welfare reform changes is very uneven across Fife, with poorer areas being hit hardest. Mid Fife is most affected, particularly Buckhaven, Methil and Wemyss Villages, The Lochs, and Lochgelly and Cardenden wards. St Andrews is the least affected ward in both Fife and Scotland.
