The Scottish Index of Multiple Deprivation (SIMD) looks at the extent to which an area (usually referred to as a small area or data zone) is ‘deprived’ across seven domains: income, employment, education, health, access to services, crime and housing. If an area is identified as ‘deprived’, this can relate to people having a low income, but it can also mean fewer resources or opportunities.

### **Technical note**

Community Councils are the most local tier of elected representation in Scotland. They are voluntary organisations set up by statute by local authorities and run by local residents to act on behalf of their areas. Their specific role can vary according to their local area’s needs. Their size, in terms of area and population, differs across Scotland.

For the purposes of this profile, each Community Council area is built up to reflect the agreed boundaries, within Fife, on a best fit basis, from both the aggregation and apportionment of 2011 data zones.
