Fife Findings: Children in families with limited resources across Scotland

Experimental Statistics - 28 November 2017



New data from the Scottish Government on "Children in families with limited resources across Scotland 2014-2016" provides estimates of the proportion of children in combined low income and material deprivation by council area and household characteristics. This was collected via the Scottish Household Survey (SHS) over three years, 2014 to 2016.

Around one in four children in Fife, and one in five children in Scotland are living in families with limited resources (after housing costs). The percentage of children in families with limited resources is highest in Glasgow (41%) and lowest in Aberdeenshire (5%). Lone parent families, families with four or more children, those renting their home, or in out of work households, are more likely to be living with limited resources.

This measure of **limited resources** brings together two aspects of poverty:

- living on a **low income** (70% of middle incomes) after housing costs (rent and mortgage payments but not council tax)
- living in **material deprivation** (being unable to afford three or more out of a list of 22 basic necessities, such as having access to £500 to deal with an unexpected expense or a child having a warm winter coat)¹.

24.1% of children in Fife live in households that experience both a low income and material deprivation



¹ The list of necessities was developed for a Scottish context and is based on what the public agree is a basic necessity and what satisfies requirements for a robust material deprivation measure.
